the Ohio River Festival of Books returns!



Join us for a celebration of the literature of the Tri-State region at the fourth Biennial Ohio River Festival of Books returning to the Big Sandy Superstore Conference Center March 7 – 8, 2008. The festival is an opportunity to showcase local talent, according to Judy Rule, Director of the Cabell County Public Library. "This is such a good opportunity to meet, greet and support our Tri-State authors and it really gets everyone excited about reading."

The keynote speaker at this year's festival is best-selling author Lisa Scottoline. Scottoline's first novel, *Everywhere That Mary Went*, published in 1994, became a bestseller. Since then she has written fourteen more legal suspense novels, all of which have appeared on bestseller lists. Another guest author will be Sharyn McCrumb, who is most famous for her works centering on the Appalachian Mountains. As with previous Festivals there will be a number of themed programs including: The Identification of Rare Books and Ephemera - A panel of experts will show you how to spot valuable books and how to speak the book language; Book Publishing and Agents - Michelle Rubin, a senior agent with Writers House; West Virginia Political Non-Fiction - Presented by Dr. Allen H. Loughry. Epistolary Literature, presented by Michelangelo Altiere, will be a fascinating program on the history and development of epistolary literature. Altiere's book, *Dearest*, is the first ever three-dimensional novel. You untie the twine and lift the lid and there you find a bundle of letters. You read through and examine the letters, newspaper articles, and artifacts to experience the novel. For children's events see the article on page 4.

First of all, I would like to publicly thank those persons who made a contribution to the Salt Rock construction in honor of my 40 years at the Library. We received over \$1000 in donations and that puts us just that much closer to our goal. The estimate of construction costs, furnishings, architect's fees and other miscellaneous charges is \$1,050,000. We have approximately \$750,000 in the Salt Rock Construction Account at this point, so we still need additional funding. If you can assist in this effort or know someone who might, please let us know.

Our Gala will be the first Saturday in March at the Marshall Student Center in the Don Morris Room. The country we are celebrating this year is Germany, so come prepared for a fine Alpine adventure. history alive!

In Celebration of Black History Month

Cabell County Public Library will host the History Alive! Program on Monday, February 11, at 6:30 p.m. at the Main Library and at 1:30 p.m. at the Barboursville Library. The program will be repeated at the Gallaher Library on Tuesday, February 12 at 4 p.m. Actor Joseph Bundy will portray Booker T. Washington, an African American leader and educator who lived from 1856-1915. As a young slave in Virginia, Booker T. Washington developed a strong desire to read. After gaining their freedom, Washington's family moved to Malden, West Virginia, where he spent his formative years and later returned to teach. In June of 1881, Washington became the first principal of Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, building it into the premier Black Industrial School in the nation. Booker T. Washington became a nationally known speaker and served as an advisor to President Theodore Roosevelt.

Created by the West Virginia Historical Council, History Alive! is a program that brings historical characters to life and is intended to actively engage audiences in a dialogue with the character.

We have some good news to report concerning our last book sale held in October. The sale garnered \$3,741.47. This is significantly more than the \$3,286.45 we collected for the June sale.

Part of the reason for the increase might have been the result of better publicity and part may lie with the different hours enacted. Our next book sale will be held February 7 - 9, 2008, including a Saturday bag sale. The hours for that sale will be 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. on all days. We plan to send all members an e-mail informing them of the sale.

One problem facing libraries is the small membership base of Friends of the Library organizations. We presently have 269 members in the Friends; however, we have 76,544 library card holders. That's a terrible ratio. We are making some progress, but we need to do so much more. We are determined to do a better job of explaining to the public all the things the Friends do. We feel this will increase participation.
